23nd Sunday in Ordinary Time: "Ephphatha!"

"Be opened!" are the words Jesus uses as he heals the deaf and mute man. These words are not just used to open ears and eyes, but to also open hearts | talents, the gifts that God has given you! to make room for Christ... to be open to the Holy Spirit. Healing is not just | Do not be afraid to dream of great things! physical, but spiritual as well. In the ancient days, physical limitations also | +Pope Francis meant social limitations. These limitations put labels on those with disabilities or illness as "untouchables" and as such, they were the unloved. In his ministry, Jesus demonstrated God' love by touching the untouchables and opening their hearts to a divine love that society had denied.

Mark's gospel supplies the foundational account for the Ephphetha Rite L which may be seen during the Easter Vigil as part of the initiation ceremony of adults who are entering the faith through the RCIA process. In this rite, the presider touches the ears and the mouth of the elect and prays that they be open to hear and proclaim the word of God in faith. This takes place before the elect is baptized. In a child's baptism, this rite actually takes place after the child is baptized. After being baptized with water, a child is anointed with I chrism, clothed in a white garment, and receives the Light of Christ. The option to use the Ephphetha Rite is then performed, touching the ears and mouth of the child saying, "The Lord Jesus made the deaf hear and the dumb speak. May he soon touch your ears to receive his word, and your mouth to proclaim his faith, to the praise and glory of God the Father."

This week reminds us to reflect on how well we are attentive to the words of Jesus and how we proclaim our faith in the world. Let us make this one word be our prayer this week - Ephphatha! - Be opened!
