The Vine and the Branches

Last week we were reminded that we are “children of God,” loved by our heavenly Father and called to love one another. Jesus showed us his Father’s love by laying down his life for us, the ultimate sacrifice of love. Today’s readings continue to share that message. St. John, in his letter, reminds us that love is empty without “deed and truth”. In other words, actions speak louder than words. God gave to us his commandments to know how to love God and others; Jesus exemplified this by demonstrating his love for us and that we are to love one another in the same manner. This is how we remain with Jesus.

We then hear in the Gospel of John, more of what it means to remain with Jesus through the parable of the “Vine and the Branches.” Societies throughout the world and throughout history all have some form of hierarchy. Within societies, there may be political agitators, political tyrants, groups fighting for power. The same was true in Jesus’ time, but Jesus gave a different view of how to live with each other in a much more gentle and loving way. The image of the vine and branches is completely opposite of any hierarchical structure, Vines are so intertwined that it is hard to see where one branch begins and another ends. The tangling of the vines continue to grow from the one stock, branching out to give more and more fruit. But, fruitfulness depends on pruning.

As we reflect in our own hearts, what is not true of the love of God, is to be pruned. What is not sharing the love of Jesus is to be pruned away, so that all that remains is the fruitful branch.

Family Table Talk

Children: How do you keep yourself connected to Jesus in your daily life?

Youth: Jesus is the vine – we are the branches, connected to Him as our life-source. When do you feel most connected to Jesus in your everyday life? How can you go there more often?
